Although looking at what has happened in our schools this term it would seem that the dreary weather has not stopped anything, in fact it feels as if we are now back into the 'normal' Link Academy groove and shaking off the pandemic impact!

It has been a busy term in other ways as well as we welcome Littleham CofE primary school into the Trust on 1st April. This school has been working with us since the start of the year and will be part of the East Devon Hub that will be established and operating in this part of Devon in the same way as the Link currently functions. We are excited about this development as we continue to focus on supporting small schools to operate effectively within their communities. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Central Support Team that the Deputy CEO, Matt Matthew oversees. They work behind the scenes managing finance, dealing with all personnel actions as well as the wellbeing of all our staff, catering, cleaning and all the estates and maintenance work, and health and safety including compliance.

I know the finance team - Louisa, Michelle, Caroline and Kylie have been flat out as we get next years budgets in and have to try and make the money stretch to do all we want it to! They also have a big job to do when integrating new schools to ensure all the individual budgets are viable with what each school wants to achieve. 'Super' Sue our HR Operations Manager does an amazing job of maintaining all personnel records, completing the ever-growing payroll and still manages to ensure the wellbeing of staff is at the forefront of all we aim to do. Linda, as Kitchen Manager has a very important job - keeping us, staff and pupils, all well fed and does an amazing job of this, we are finally preparing the meals for all but 2 schools and we are working towards all schools.

The Estates maintenance work is brilliantly undertaken by Will and his white van full of tools who spends the week going around to ensure our sites are safe and tidy. Since he has been going around to all schools, we have had a much more effective service that sorts out issues before they become a problem- Will is invaluable! Our Estates work is now led by Claire from Yeoford- she keeps all the compliance work up to date as well as planning Will's schedule and has agreed to support some of the aspects of the Building Projects. They are an amazing team that allow our Academy Heads to focus on their work and the provision of excellent education for the pupils. A Massive Easter thank you!!!!

Last year we had an excellent, successful round of Condition Improvement Fund bids that saw 5 major projects completed across the Trust amounting to £1.2 million, so we really thought that this year we would not be considered for anymore. To the contrary, we have been approved for a new roof at Harbertonford and Fire Safety/ Electrical upgrades at Wolborough and Widecombe in the Moor which amount to £860,000 worth of improvements! Our schools continue to improve in their condition and the effectiveness of the learning environments, and we are really proud of this.

Finally, I would like to wish you all a great Easter break, and thank you for all the support you have given our schools. Please read all the amazing things that are happening in our schools- they are such a credit to the Trust and provide the pupils and families with such creative learning opportunities in every single school.

Bearnes Primary School



It's been a busy term full of encouraging change here at Bearnes. As always, the children have shown resilience and embraced every new opportunity with enthusiasm and determination. In January, we began our collaboration with Wolborough Primary School. Broadhempston Primary School



The term has been incredibly busy with class assemblies allowing the children to share their learning with parents.
